

Research Project Proposal

The **Research Project Folio** consists of two main criteria, **Planning and Development**. The first main assessment criterion is 'Planning' and an important part to this is the Research Proposal.

What is the Research Project Proposal?

Whenever a new project is undertaken, it usually begins with a Proposal. Essentially a Research Project Proposal suggests and explains two main things:

- **What** the Research Project will be about (including a main question and sub-questions or topics)
- **How** the research could be undertaken

How long is the Research Project Proposal?

The Proposal is forms part, usually the first part, of the **Folio** (of which a maximum of 10 pages or 20 minutes multimodal could moderated by SACE). Planning can occur throughout your Folio but mostly occurs in the Proposal which is usually one page of **500 to 600 words** (or equivalent if multimodal) as well as in mind-maps, or planning charts.

What should be included in the Proposal?

- 1. Introduce the background to your topic and Question:**
 - Why did you decide on this topic?
 - What is your refined question?
 - Why is this question particularly interesting and worth researching?
 - What other research or information or research is available on your topic?
- 2. Identify your main question, and what are your focus questions:**
 - What is your **main question**?
 - What does your **main question mean**? (Define keywords and explain what you mean)
 - What foundation (who, what, where, why, when, how) focus questions will you need to answer to help answer the main question? (Most students have **4-5 focus questions**).
- 3. Explain the Research Processes** you intend to use and identify possible sources.

- What **research processes or actions** do you intend to or could you use to answer your question?
- These might include: websites, articles, books, surveys, interviews, practical etc etc (BE AS SPECIFIC AS YOU CAN, include reference details with titles and names etc).
- Explain why these sources would be suitable for your research topic and question.

- 4. Choose and explain which capabilities or capability** that you will be developing during the Research Project Folio. You need to choose one or more of the following capabilities:

- Literacy
- Numeracy
- Personal and Social Capability
- Information and Communication Technology Capability
- Critical or creative thinking
- Ethical Understanding
- Intercultural Understanding.

The two main things to show in your Folio and Proposal is the **understanding** (knowing what it means) and **development** (doing or demonstrating) **one or more of these capabilities**.

Please refer to the **SACE, Australian Curriculum websites** if you are unsure about what these capabilities mean for you and your Research Project.

- 5. Other information** to support your Proposal might include where appropriate:
 - **Safety considerations** (for you and others)
 - **Ethical considerations** (is this a sensitive topic? How will you ensure you research ethically?)
 - **Timelines and mind-maps** to support your planning.
 - **Any other piece of information to show planning of your research.**

The Proposal forms part of the Folio, which also includes Development.
